

## Price Guide For Replacing ALL of Your Teeth

These solutions are for you if you've got lots of broken down teeth and want to avoid dentures, or if you already have dentures and want to upgrade them to something more solid and natural feeling. All of these solutions look very natural and are rock solid for chewing. They are not removable and do not move at all when eating, talking, or smiling.



### **Option 1: NATURAL Full Arch Implant Bridge- "The Cadillac"**

- Best for younger people with lots of remaining natural teeth.
- Replace all your teeth with 8-10 implants per jaw and a full set of porcelain crowns and bridges.
- The most natural looking and feeling solution, since we preserve your natural gums and bone.
- Made out of titanium and ceramic with excellent esthetics and long-term strength, protected by our 7 Year Guarantee.
- This solution costs more (\$55k to \$65k per jaw), and takes longer (6-12 months), but it's the closest thing modern medicine has to "re-growing" your natural teeth.



### **Option 2: Teeth In A Day (Also called All-On-X) "Standard"**

- Best for older people who have been in dentures for a long time, or people who have been told before that they don't have enough bone for implants.
- Requires less surgery and bone grafting than Option 1, and half the number of implants (4 to 6 implants per jaw).
- Made out of titanium and ceramic with excellent esthetics and long-term strength, protected by our 7 Year Guarantee.
- This solution costs far less than Option 1 (about \$35k to \$42k per jaw), and the best part... you will leave with a full set of brand new, rock solid, screwed in teeth in only about 24 hours.



### **Option 3: VALUE Teeth In A Day (Also called All-On-X)**

- Best for people who want Option 2, but can't quite afford the full amount right away.
- Uses advanced 3D printed and milled resin materials that are faster and cheaper to make than traditional ceramics, saving you money.
- Esthetics are 80% as good as Option 2, but still look and feel very natural, protected by our 3 Year Guarantee.
- By giving up some long-term strength, you get a result that looks and feels almost the same as Option 2, but costs less (about \$20k to \$25k per arch). You can always "upgrade" to ULTRA ceramic teeth later on, if you want for an additional \$10,000- \$28,000

## Price Guide for Replacing ONE OR TWO Missing Teeth

### **Do Nothing**

Not all missing teeth need to be replaced. If you are not worried about your chewing or appearance, then you might choose to leave the missing tooth alone. Keep in mind that since your bone shrinks over time, if you do change your mind later it will probably be more difficult and expensive than today.



### **Option 1: Dental Implant With Bone Reconstruction**



Implants are usually the most expensive and the slowest option. If the bone is broken down and needs to be rebuilt, an implant can cost around \$6,000, and take around 6-12 months. But the good news is that an implant is the nicest looking, longest lasting, strongest, and safest option. You can smile, eat, and chew just like a natural tooth! In fact, most of our patients say that it's the next best thing to re-growing your own tooth.

### **Option 2: Regular Dental Implant**

If the bone is in good condition already, and reconstruction is not needed, then the cost is around \$4,600. In most cases, major bone grafting can be avoided saving you \$1,000 to \$2,000.

### **Option 3: Bridge**

A bridge is a little less expensive than an implant (around \$4,800), and it can be done relatively quickly (2-3 weeks). The downside though is there is a chance of increased cold sensitivity in your teeth, or even root canal problems in some situations. Bridges can also be difficult to clean when food gets stuck underneath them. This can cause cavities and failure, which means taking the bridge and starting from scratch.



### **Option 4: Removable Partial Denture.**

This is the cheapest and fastest option. It will cost around \$2,600 and take a couple of weeks. The problem is that they are removable, which means that they are not nearly as stable as the options above. You can't expect to eat or chew or grind your food very well, and you CAN expect to get food stuck around them, and to have metal hooks that might show in your smile. They are the cheapest, but this is definitely the least comfortable, functional, and desirable option.
